Because of this hardly anybody realizes that the story takes place on what is now Slovenian soil, including the area of the town of Kanal. Many readers probably remember the city of Gorica as the place where the story begins and surely everybody remembers Milano as the place where the love between the two main characters flourished. But until recently, apart from a couple of enthusiastic locals, no one ever had the faintest idea that the most dramatic event of the novel takes place in Kanal.
