Every answer I give in the commentary has been well-researched and is well-supported by the facts. This commentary has been and continues to be a labor of love for me. I want to factually explain everything possible about the Bible so that Christians have a full understanding of scripture (and non-Christians; you can read the book too!). I have used almost 300 sources in just this book, and I predict that the next volume will have hundreds more because I want there to be no doubt about the Bible's veracity. And I fully explore the meaning of each verse because I want people to have answers to questions that they perhaps never thought to ask before. What makes Genesis different from every other creation story? What is the importance of Tubal-Cain being a blacksmith, and what does it tell us about his people? Why did Noah get drunk off wine if he was a righteous man? Why did it take so long for the people to get to Shinar after the flood? Where is Shinar, anyway? All these questions and more are answered in this commentary! I hope you're excited, because this book is 468 pages of learning, and learning is fun!
