Marikana

Voices from South Africa's Mining Massacre

Ohio University Press **The Marikana Massacre of August 16, 2012, was the single most lethal use of force by South African security forces against civilians since the end of apartheid. Those killed were mineworkers in support of a pay raise. Through a series of interviews conducted with workers who survived the attack, this account documents and examines the controversial shootings in great detail, beginning with a valuable history of the events leading up to the killing of workers, and including eyewitness accounts of the violence and interviews with family members of those who perished. While the official Farlam Commission investigation of the massacre is still ongoing, many South Africans do not hold much confidence in the government's ability to examine its own complicity in these events. Marikana, on the other hand, examines the various roles played by the African National Congress, the mine company, and the National**

Union of Mineworkers in creating the conditions that led to the massacre. While the commission's investigations take place in a courtroom setting tilted toward those in power, Marikana documents testimony from the mineworkers in the days before official statements were even gathered, offering an unusually immediate and unfiltered look at the reality from the perspective of those most directly affected. Enhanced by vivid maps that make clear the setting and situation of the events, Marikana is an invaluable work of history, journalism, sociology, and activism.

Land, Law and Chiefs in Rural South Africa

Contested histories and current struggles

Wits University Press **This edited collection illustrates contestations over land and political authority in South Africa's rural areas, focusing on threats to popular rights and how they are being supported. Who controls the land and minerals in the former Bantustans of South Africa - chiefs, the state or landholders? Disputes are taking place around the ownership of resources, decisions about their exploitation and who should benefit. With respect to all of these issues, the courts have become increasingly important. The contributors to Land, Law and Chiefs in Rural South Africa capture some of these intense contestations over land, law and political authority, focussing on threats to the rights of ordinary people. History and customary law feature strongly in most disputes and succession to chieftaincy is also frequently disputed. Judges have to make decisions in a context where rival claimants to property or office assert their own versions of history and custom. The South African constitution recognizes customary law and the courts are attempting to incorporate and develop this branch of jurisprudence as 'living customary law'. Lawyers, community leaders and academics are called on to assist in researching cases around restitution, land rights and customary law. The chapters in this collection discuss legal cases and policy directions that have evolved since 1994. Some chapters analyze the increasing power of chiefs in the South African rural areas, while others suggest that the courts are giving**

support to popular rights over land and supporting local democratic processes. Contributors record significant pushback from groups that reject traditional authority. These political tensions are a central theme of the collection and thus serve as vital case studies in furthering our understanding of rights and restitution in South Africa.

Mining and Responsible Investment : Dangerous Liaisons?

The case is set on 14 November 2012 when the protagonist, Hilde Svensson, head of equity at Scandinavia Bank, a global asset manager in charge of managing the responsible equity portfolio of Scandinavia Pension Fund (SPF) - a responsible institutional investor - arrives for a visit of Lonmin's platinum mine facilities in the Rustenburg area of South Africa (SA). The visit has been arranged for a group of Principle for Responsible Investment (PRI) signatories in

the aftermath of the Marikana tragedy, which took place on 16 August 2012. Hilde Svensson has been requested by SPF to assess the Lonmin situation on site in order to make a decision on what to do with the Lonmin stock, where SPF is the third largest shareholder and rather heavily exposed with around 4%-6% total shareholding in Lonmin Plc. The case deals with the various complexities faced by responsible investors and illustrates the difficulties in conducting an Environment, Social and Governance (ESG) analysis as part of an integrated financial analysis. The case is set in South Africa, an emerging market economy, although the head office of the company (Lonmin Plc) is based in the UK. The distance between management and operations provides further depth as it allows students to consider the practicality of such an arrangement within an already complex social setup. This is further supported by the protagonist and her team also being non-South African, to illustrate the various challenges presented when international responsible investors do not necessarily have the full contextual background they will need to understand the conundrum and risks at hand.

Routledge **Apartheid South Africa was often thought to run in the interests of the business elite. Yet 27 years after apartheid, those business interests remain largely entrenched. Why? Did the South African business community play a role in engineering this outcome - perhaps recognising the apartheid era was over, and jumping ship in time? Conversely, the mission of the ANC was widely perceived to be to shift wealth and power into the hands of the whole community. Yet despite 'black empowerment' measures, corporate ownership remains largely in white hands - and certainly in the hands of an elite few, even though no longer restricted to whites. This picture is replicated across the global south, where corporate ownership tends to be concentrated in the hands of an elite, rather than being more democratically spread. Why have alternative corporate forms not been pursued more vigorously, with ownership in the hands of customers, employees, and local communities? In the case of South Africa, where the majority of customers and employees are black, this could have delivered on the ANC's mission to replace the apartheid era with a democratic one - in terms of wealth, incomes and power, as well as in terms of voting and civic rights. This edited volume explores all these questions and looks at ways to align corporate forms with economic and social goals.
